Any member of APS may submit a grant application and an individual or organization may join the Society in order to submit a grant.

Three to four grants are funded each year. Typically awards range from \$250-\$1,000.

**PLANT PORTRAIT
PENSTEMON EXIMEUS**

This is the tallest penstemon in the genera. It has some similar features as *P. palmeri* and is in the Section Peltranthera, subsection Peltanthera. The only photo I had seen up to this year was one of someone holding the main stem way over his head - making the plant about seven feet tall. *P. eximeus* is native to the dry sandy arroyos of Baja California and has not been in cultivation in the States for very long.

The plants that I have seen are five to eight feet in height with two to four main stems and quite floriferous. The flowers are pinkish white with strong violet guidelines. The staminode is white and glabrous. There is a pleasant aroma to the flowers but it is not strong.

We first saw the plant outside the garden shop at Tohono Chul Park in Tucson. The plants were in both one and five gallon pots and quite striking in appearance. They were cultivated by Russ Buhrow, Curator of Plants at the gardens. He told us that someone had given him seed collected in Baja and he was able to germinate and raise plants from these quite easily. He told us that he hadn't had any problems with the low temperatures that are present in Tucson in winter but did have a little problem with root rot if they stayed damp too long.

We bought a couple of plants in the one gallon pots, brought them back to Denver and planted them in our garden in early March. The bed they were planted in was 1/3 sand, 1/3 grit and 1/3 soil. They grew rapidly and the lower temperatures, down to the low 20's, didn't seem to bother them at all. Neither plant reached seven feet in our garden the first year but both were about five feet and bloomed fairly heavily in early June.

This part of our garden got watered about once a week but we had no problems with rot, bugs or anything. The plants were quite hardy and vigorous in their development. Russ told us that they did have some problem with pollinators and seed production was lower than he would have liked. However, our two plants were constantly pollinated by bees and shown in the next photo.

Later in the summer one of the plants up and died but left a wealth of seed. The other plant continued to be vigorous and had a second smaller blooming in October before our first freeze.

This is definitely not a plant for the front part of the garden but has beauty and interest to gardens where taller plants are tolerated. I have mulched the remaining plant with leaves and hope that it overwinters. We also plan to try and germinate more plants next year. This is a fun plant to grow and have in your garden.

American Penstemon Society 2011 Annual Meeting

Dear American Penstemon Society member,

You are cordially invited to attend the APS 2011 Annual Meeting and excursions to tour parts of the Siskiyou Mountains of southeastern Oregon. Put these dates on your calendar: July 8, 9 and 10, Friday through Sunday. In two days, we will tour the Mt. Ashland loop and go to the environs of Bear Camp. On the Mt. Ashland loop, beginning near the ski area and traveling southwest past two small peaks almost to the California border, you will likely see six penstemon species. Several short hikes are available. Traveling up to 7000' over gravel roads, you will also see a dizzying array of other perennials and shrubs at their peak bloom. You'll be given a folder with 80 color photos of just some of the flowers to be seen. The Bear Camp drive goes about 30 miles west of Grant's Pass into the Coast Range, where we'll see 6-8 pent species, plus some plant rarities on an easy gravel road; several short hikes available. Choose to go here Sunday if you're planning to continue on to Gold Beach on the coast (another 30+ miles) Each day will average about 80 miles of stop-and-go driving. Check out the interesting speakers listed below and great meals together.

SOUTHERN OREGON – MORE THAN PENSTEMONS *Val Myrick, Sonora, California*

While penstemons will be our focus when we meet in Medford for the APS 2011 Annual Meeting, there are many other attractions we might want to take advantage of, coming to and going from this Southern Oregon city.



First and foremost, at least for me, is the 363 miles of rugged Oregon coast.

Beautiful ocean views, lighthouses, seafood, and lots of flora and fauna are there to be discovered.

Crater Lake, Oregon's only national park, is also at the top of my list. This special 1900 feet (add: foot) deep lake, the nation's deepest, can be reached via the Rogue---Umpqua National Scenic Byway out of Roseburg from I-5. Other routes also access it.

Ashland lies just south of Medford and is renowned for its Oregon Shakespeare Summer Festival. The town itself is quite charming. Lithia Park can be visited for a horticultural fix.

Jacksonville, the whole town a National Historic Landmark, is another picturesque village from the 1850 gold rush days. The summer Britt Festival offers the opportunity to attend concerts featuring a wide range of musical acts.

Who hasn't found Harry and David's catalog in their holiday mailbox? This gourmet fruit and confection company can be found right in Medford itself. Tours can be arranged as well as a visit to the big store for a Moose Munch treat.

Dozens of wineries along with many golf courses can be found in the valleys surrounding Medford. There are several museums as well.

For the lovers of speed and adventure, a jet boat trip up the Rogue River and Hellgate Canyon out of Grant's Pass might be just the thing. Long trips, short trips, with and without meals, can all be booked.

The beautiful marble Oregon Caves National Monument can be found 50 miles southwest of Grants Pass. The 1½-hour tour takes you through popcorn, moonmilk, stalactite, and stalagmite formations.

The craziest attraction of all is a bed and breakfast resort 25 miles southwest of the caves called Out 'n' About Treehouse Treesort. You can stay and play in the 10 tree houses that populate the compound.

As you can see, Oregon offers something for everyone. If you can spare the time, enhance your Medford visit with a few wonderful side trips.

On September 21, 2010, Dee Strickler was diagnosed with a malignant Stage IV brain tumor, after collapsing at an adult study at his church. On October 8 the tumor was removed at Kalispell Regional Medical Center using their new \$500,000 remotely controlled "Navigator" scalpel. He came home two days later! When his head was healed (Nov. 21) he started radiation therapy, also in Kalispell, and chemo in capsule form. He is through with this course of chemo and has only seven radiation treatments left. He is weak and very tired. Dee had no nausea, but the side effects of his many medications have been unpleasant and entailed two trips to the ER. His wife Claire feels qualified to apply for a Pharmacy Technician license after serving as his pill dispenser for 3 1/2 months! He is grateful that all this technology was in place only 15 miles from home. They are both grateful for the many prayers and messages of concern from friends. 
